READY TO READ

- Read to your child, every day from birth!
- Halfway through a book, ask your child, "What do you think will happen next?"
- When reading, have conversations with your child including taking turns and asking questions back and forth.
- Use signs in the environment as learning opportunities. "That sign says 'stop'. The first letter is s. It makes the 'sss' sound. Like your name, 'Ssssally'."
- Look up answers to questions together.

THINGS I KNOW

- Color or draw a picture together and practice colors, shapes, and letters.
- Play Tic Tac Toe, I Spy, and Hot and Cold.
- Count objects in the environment: cereal, people in their home, etc.
- Point out shapes in your environment: signs, windows, objects, etc.

ALL BY MYSELI

- Play dress-up together.
- Pull the zipper off an old pair of pants and have the children practice with it.
- Let your child get dressed, undressed, and use the bathroom by themselves (as much as they can) even if it takes more time.

I CAN DO THAT!/ALL ABOUT ME

- Get a pair of child safety scissors.
- Save newspapers, wrapping paper, or ads for your child to practice cutting. If they have trouble cutting paper, try clay or Play-doh.
- Play pretend with your child: "Today, I am a lion. What are you?" Then come back to their real name and age.
- Practice learning names of other family members.

CARE AND SHARE: EXPRESSING FEELINGS/LEARNING PATIENCE

- When your child is upset, sit in a chair snuggling with him/her. Ask how they feel and listen to the answer.
- When watching TV together, ask questions like, "Why do you think they are crying?"
- At bedtime, ask your child to list two or three things that happened that day that made them happy.
- Play freeze tag or have a three-legged race.
- Get two children to hold a towel between them and then bounce a ball in the middle.
- Give a small treat to the child who can sit the longest.
- Play board or card games.
- Get two different ice cream cones, then ask to trade a bite for a bite.
- Color a picture together using only two or three crayons.
- Teach your child how to walk up to pets.
- Visit free public places: the library, the mall, playgrounds, parks, farmers' markets, etc.
 - Provide opportunities for play and socialization with other children and adults. Sharing things and time with children, adults, and new people is different.
